

Elder Terrance L. Williams, Jr.



Terrance Lee Williams, Jr. received his Ministers License in June 2014. He is the Chaplin of TRYM Youth Ministry at BTFWC as well as the President of the Brotherhood Ministry at BTFWC. He is the husband of Romica Williams and the father of 7 children (5 girls and 2 boys) and he has a great passion for the word of God. But life for Terrance has not always been this good.

He was born on August 21, 1975 in Omaha, NE. He was the product of a single parent home. His mother passed away when he was 14 years old and it was during this trying time that he became involved with gangs. Although he loved rapping and performing in an all-boys band, he continued to hang out with the gangs and dropped out of school at the beginning of his junior year. By the time he was 17 years old he was an alcoholic and a drug addict. He moved to Aurora Colorado and even got baptized in Jesus name. But that didn't stop him and things got progressively worst. After years of breaking the law he ended up in prison at the age of 29 for aggravated robbery, simple robbery, and assault. It was by the grace of God that he only did 7 years of a 12 year prison sentence.

While in prison he began to seek The Lord. In July 2005 he received the Holy Ghost while at a service in prison. From that point on not only did he develop a strong relationship with The Lord but he studied His Word daily seeking Him fervently in prayer for understanding. He completed a two year Correspondence Course with the School of Christ designed by B. H. Clendennen. He began to teach the word of God to other inmates in prison and became an inmate appointed pastor. While in prison he was given the opportunity to go to a College campus and speak the word of God to civilians.

After his release from prison he took Paul's advice, "forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before". With that in mind he returned back to his home church BTFWC and prayed fervently that the Lord would provide him with a job that he could be proud of. After searching diligently he landed a job at Harris Rebar as a construction fabricator.

After settling down in his job and his church, Terrance had a great desire to help young men and keep them from going down the same road he went. With the blessing of his pastor he started "Shop Talk". A ministry designed to encourage young men ages 6 to 18 to talk about day to day struggles (real life issues) in a barber shop setting and at the same time get a free haircut.

He has a desire to give hope to the youth and anyone else who has had a rough start in life. As he says, "God is still working miracles. He is still changing people. He is still on the throne..."
